		6 – 9 Months: Expresses a range of emotions Understands "No" Shows frustration when a toy is taken away Waves bye-bye Understands commands such as "Let's go" by raising arms up		4 - 5 Years: Often tests people to see who can be controlled Is boastful about self and family Has a good imagination Often is bossy; goes from bossy to shy Is selective about playmates; often has stormy relationships
		 9 – 12 Months: Follows simple directions with gestures Imitates simple actions 12 - 15 Months: When asked to do so, will share a toy Enjoys helping Displays anxiety when strangers are near Beginning to become independent 		5 - 6 Years: Likes conversations during meals In general is reliable and well adjusted Is interested in where babies come from Is not too demanding in relations with others May fear mother won't return If doesn't like school, may become ill & vomit Is concerned about pleasing adults; likes praise
		15 - 18 Months: Engages, disengages, then reengages with others for a short period of time Plays alone or watches others 18 - 24 Months: Engages in side-by-side play with peers Uses words & body language to communicate feeling is generally in a happy mood is possessive of own things		6 – 7 Years: Does not like being kissed in public Finds it difficult to accept criticism or blame Friendships are unstable; is a tattletale Must be a winner; will change rule to win Typically negative, rigid, demanding Displays violent extremes May blame mother for things that go wrong
